A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIRMAN

I expect we have all known diamonds in the rough, kids who grow up in difficult circumstances and who are obviously gifted. Sometimes these kids overcome the obstacles and they, and we as a society, receive the benefits. Other times, things don't go so well. Two stories come to mind.

Robert Byrd grew up in persistently hard times. Although not necessarily impoverished, he once described his ladder of success as having the bottom rungs kicked out. He received a good education at Mark Twain high school and then embarked on a lifetime of self-education. We all know the rest of that story.

A friend told me of meeting a young girl in a small, poor, southern West Virginia town many years ago. She was obviously very bright and my friend had the idea, and the means, to send her to prep school in the Northeast. Upon reflection, he decided that would be too much of an intrusion into her life. Many years later, he ran into her working as a cocktail waitress in a Charleston bar.

Stories like these come to mind when I reflect on the work of the West Virginia Independent Colleges and Universities. We cannot listen to the stories of the students receiving the Circle of Vision scholarships without appreciating several common themes. These kids are very bright and quite articulate. The students almost all come from difficult circumstances. Finally, the Circle of Vision scholarships proved to be the difference for the students between attending a private four-year college in West Virginia or some less desirable alternative.

West Virginia Independent Colleges and Universities is funded by the member schools. Thanks to Executive Director Ben Exley's aggressive frugality and the support of Administrative Assistant Charlotte Lyons, the overhead costs of the organization are consistently reviewed and often reduced. As a result of the structure, 100 cents of every dollar donated to WVICU drops to scholarships. Not one penny is diverted to fund overhead.

Under Ben's leadership, WVICU has focused on increasing the number of Circle of Vision scholarships available to students. At a recent retreat held on the campus of West Virginia Wesleyan College, we heard from admission officers that the need for the Circle of Vision scholarships well exceeds the current capacity of WVICU to supply them. We are also asking donors to make four year commitments so that the Circle of Vision scholarship is available to the student for his or her entire college undergraduate career.

To say that I'm haunted by the prospect of a bright kid being left behind due to circumstances beyond his control would paint me as more thoughtful and sensitive than I know I am. But I do worry about it, particularly when I know that an adequate number of fully funded Circle of Vision scholarships is a real, effective and powerful tool to give these kids the chance that they need and deserve.

CIRCLE OF VISION SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM BACKGROUND

The Circle of Vision Scholarship Program provides a unique opportunity for West Virginia students to attend one of our eight private colleges and universities. Many of these scholars are the first in any generation of their family to attend a college or university. These students are motivated and successful.

Circle of Vision donors contribute \$10,000 or more each year designated to the program. Established in 1997, Circle of Vision Scholarships have been awarded to 3,118 students totaling \$4,845,620.

In 2014, Circle of Vision members provided \$394,400 to our member institutions, assisting 60 students from West Virginia who demonstrated financial need and academic excellence. Please read the quotes from Circle of Vision graduates included in this report.



Choosing Wesleyan was a simple decision for me. I grew up in Buckhannon and my mom was a longtime employee at the school. My dad graduated from Wesleyan in 1977. As a kid I enjoyed

being around the college and was even the crown bearer at the age of seven for the 1994 homecoming coronation.

Although I had close ties with Wesleyan before enrolling, it offered far more than I expected. As a freshman, I gained a passion for learning and a determination for succeeding in the classroom. After exploring different subjects, I chose to major in History and later added minors in both Spanish and

Business Administration.

I was thrilled when I received the Circle of Vision Scholarships given by The Bernard McDonough Foundation and Parry Petroplus. The scholarship helped reduce the financial stress that comes with pursuing a college education and opened doors to new opportunities. Because of the scholarship, I was able to avoid working a part-time position and instead volunteered as a coach for the Buckhannon-Upshur High School soccer programs. It also helped me free up money to study abroad in Costa Rica and hone my Spanish language skills. I am intensely appreciative for the donations that The Bernard McDonough Foundation and Parry Petroplus made to the Circle of Vision Scholarship Program and the investment that was made organizational behavior to make this happen. in me while pursuing an education at Wesleyan.

After graduating from Wesleyan with both Bachelor of Arts and MBA degrees, I weighed two paths: pursuing a career in project management or pursuing a career in education. While at Wesleyan I developed an interest in education. So much so that I was selected for Teach for America, but I made the tough decision not to accept after not being placed in a rural area of need. Interestingly enough, however, my first job out of college was teaching Math to middle and high school students at the Elkins Mountain School.

While teaching, I earned the Certified Associate in Project Management (CAPM) credential and after about a semester of teaching – the position was fulltime, but not long-term - I was offered a position with my current employer, DHA Group, Inc. (DHA), which I have been with since 2010. DHA is a management consulting and contracting firm serving Federal Government agencies including the Department of Justice (DOJ) and Department of Defense (DOD). It employs approximately 200 people with offices in Washington, DC and Bridgeport, WV. As an Associate Program Manager, I assist with the management of current projects and bidding of future projects that are mission critical for our clients.

At Wesleyan, I learned the value of becoming a lifelong learner. Since graduating I have earned the Certified Associate in Project Management (CAPM) and Project Management Professional (PMP) credentials from the Project Management Institute (PMI) and a Graduate Certificate in Human Resource Management from Fairmont State University.

My future plans are to continue in the field of management. I have interests in both project management and human resource management. Career goals of mine are to become an adjunct business professor while working and to ultimately return to academia as a business professor and program director at a liberal arts college. I am weighing the decision to pursue a doctorate degree in management or
